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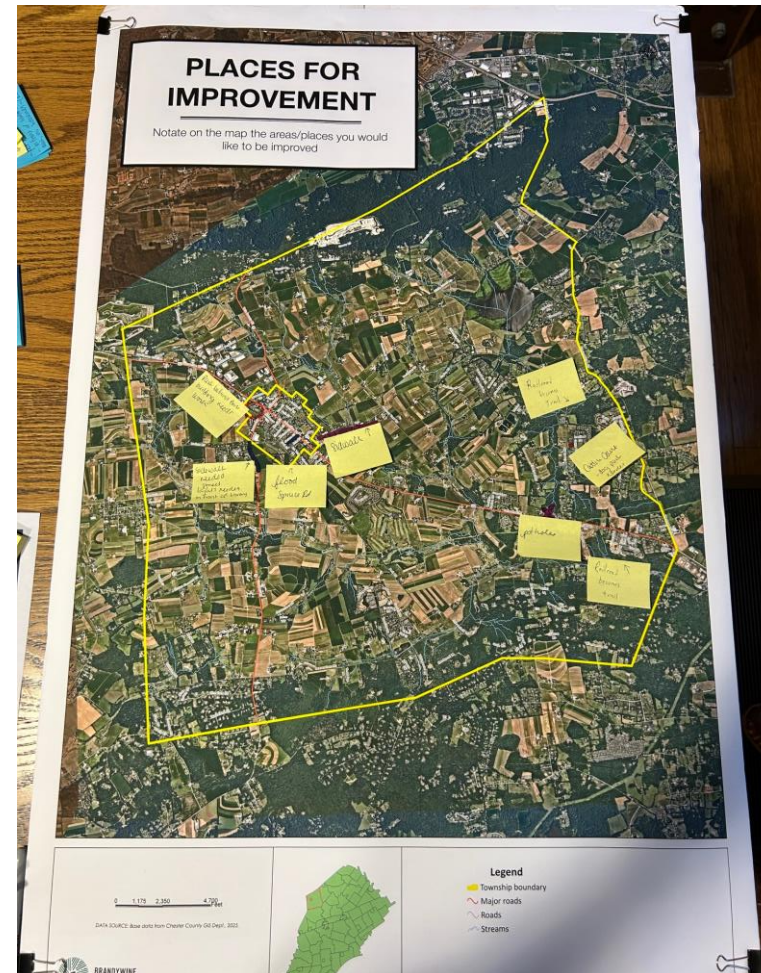

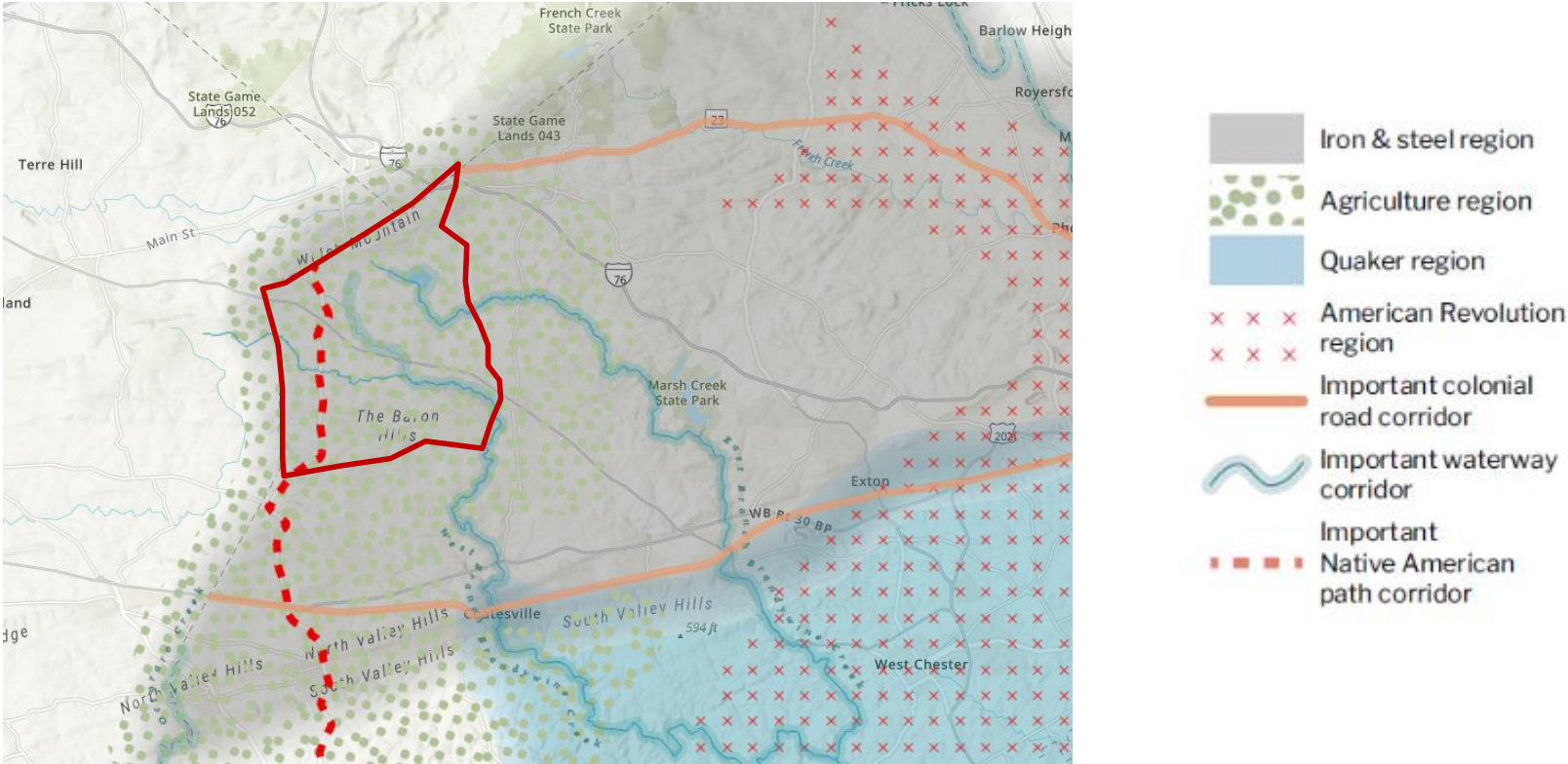

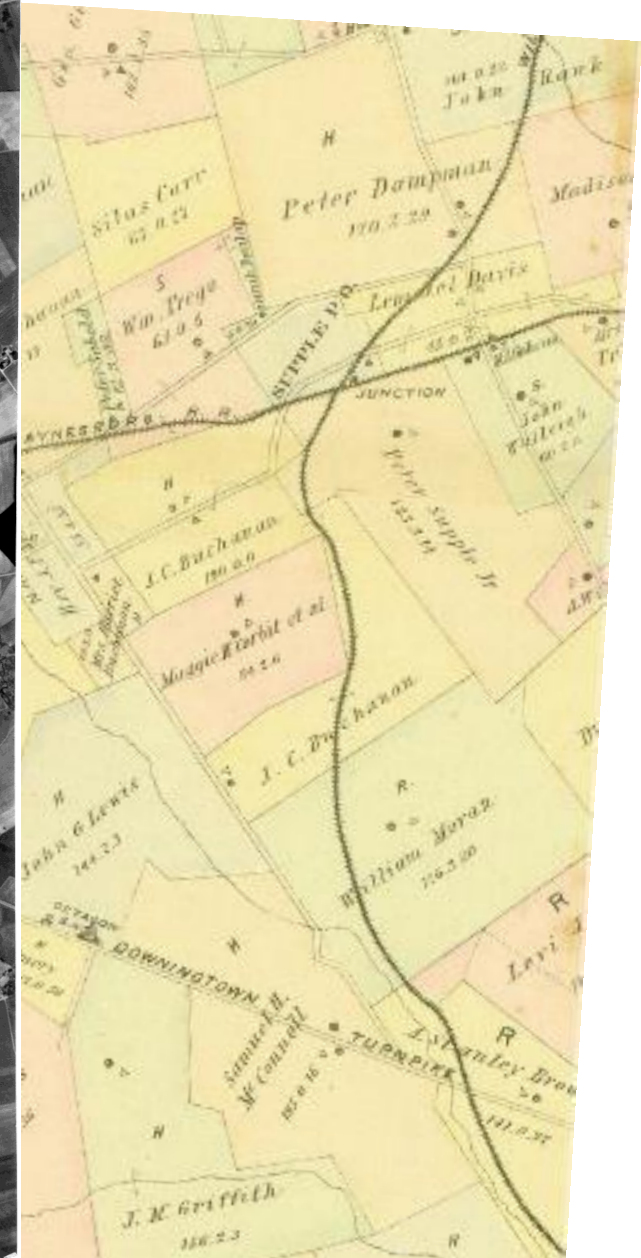

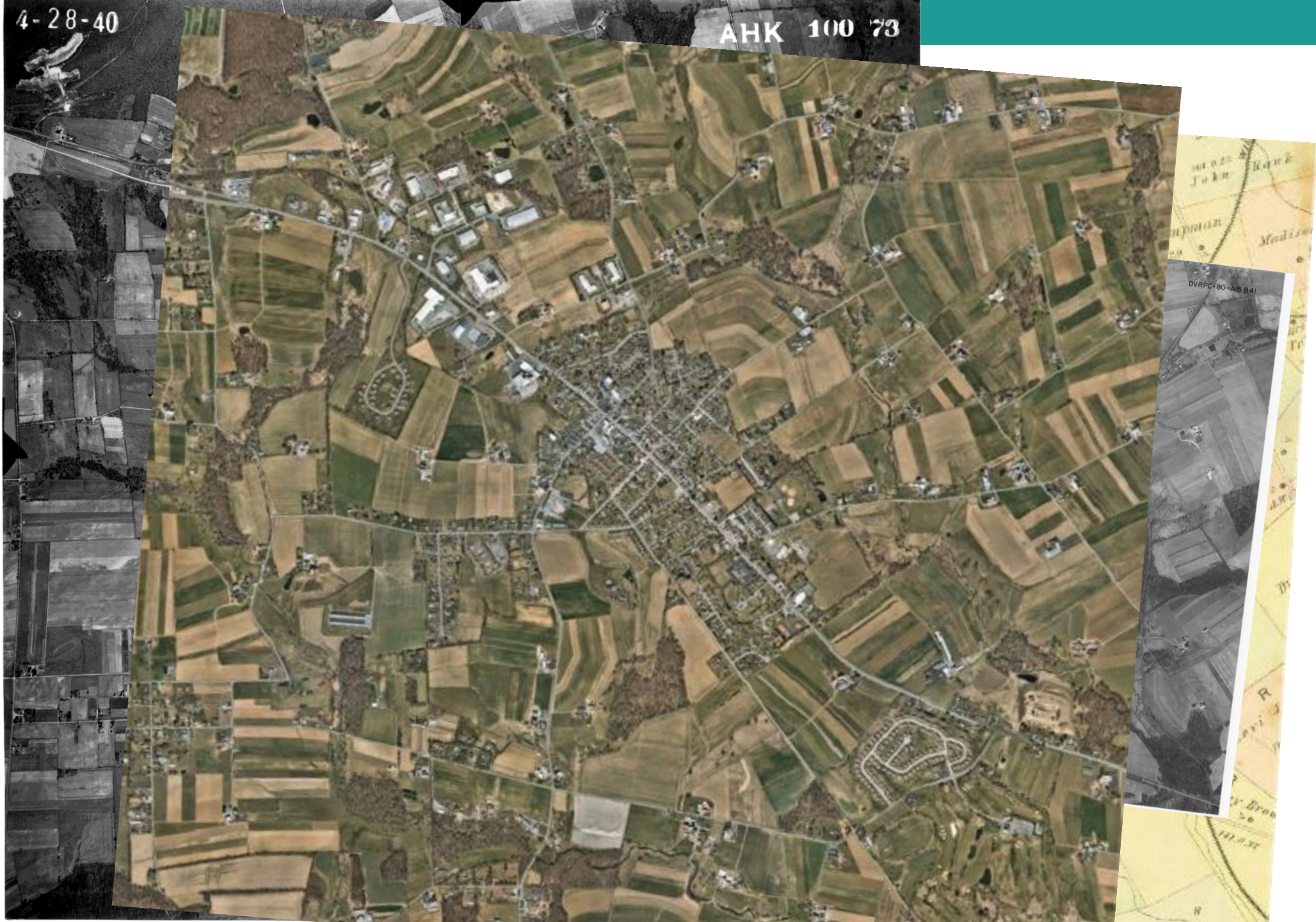

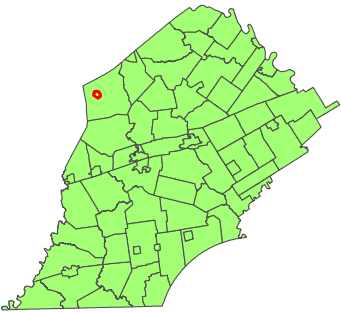

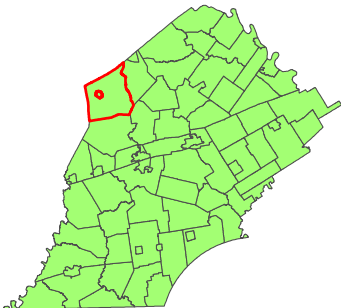

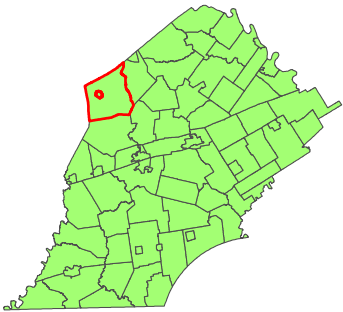

Historic and Scenic Resources: Overall Planning Objectives

- Recognize and preserve the cohesive cultural landscape formed by the agricultural fields, woodlands, open spaces, and early settlement patterns of the historic borough. - Recognize that historic preservation should be responsive and adaptable as communities evolve. Maintain up-to-date inventories of resources, integrate preservation into ongoing planning processes, and ensure stewardship that balances preservation with contemporary needs.

Historic and Scenic Resources

Goal: Preserve the historic and cultural integrity of the Honey Brook area, encourage the reuse of its historic resources, and protect the scenic viewsheds and rural landscapes that define the community's character.

- Support the formation of a Township and Borough Historical Commission(s) with residents willing to carry out Commission responsibilities such as reviewing land use applications affecting historic resources, advising/making recommendations to elected officials on such applications, developing historic resource inventories, and engaging the community through education and outreach.
- Conduct a comprehensive update of the Township and Borough's historic resource survey, originally completed in 1982 as part of the Chester County Historic Site Survey, to identify and document historic buildings, structures, sites, districts, and landscapes. Ensure the updated survey reflects current preservation standards,

includes historic resources dating from 1975 and earlier, and serves as a foundation for informed planning, land use decisions, and future preservation initiatives. Request technical assistance and guidance from Chester County Planning Commission, as needed.

- Updated inventories should be provided to Chester County for inclusion in the County's Historic Resource Atlas and the Pennsylvania Historical and Museum Commission's online database, PA-SHARE.
- Seek formal determination of eligibility for or designation on the National Register of Historic Places for Honey Brook Borough Historic District and/or select individual sites. This will require formal, detailed documentation and analysis that includes photographs, property/site history, maps, site plan, and bibliography.
- Consider adding historic resource protection provisions, including incentives, within Township and Borough Zoning Ordinances, to encourage the adaptive reuse of historic resources and discourage their destruction. Consideration should be given to the potential establishment of Act 167 historic preservation ordinances for the historic district in Honey Brook Borough.
- Consider applying for Certified Local Government (CLG) status to strengthen the Township and Borough's historic preservation program. CLG designation provides access to technical assistance, training, and grant opportunities, enhances local preservation capacity, and formalizes the community's commitment to protecting historic resources.
- Identify and map visually prominent open spaces, natural landscapes, and historic landscapes in Honey Brook.

Goal 2: Broaden educational and outreach efforts about Honey brook's historic resources to build community awareness and support for their long-term protection.

- Create educational materials such as brochures, online resources, and interpretive signage that would provide further information on the community's heritage as it relates to the buildings and landscapes of the region.
- Partner with local schools, libraries, and historical organizations to integrate local history and preservation topics into community and education.
- Support homeowners and business owners in maintaining historic properties by providing information on tools and resources regarding general maintenance, repair, and rehabilitation of historic homes to ensure the long-term health of historic neighborhoods.
