












Brandywine Creek Greenway

a vision for the future

The Brandywine Creek Greenway is a tapestry of privately protected open space and public lands that forms a green corridor along both branches and the main stem of the Brandywine.

Parks, creek access points, and cultural attractions are linked together by the Brandywine Creek and the network of trails that span its length—trails that allow visitors to walk, bike or horse-back ride from Honey Brook to Chadds Ford.

The most sensitive natural and cultural resources are protected and enhanced as municipalities and landowners are inspired to conserve and restore the cultural and natural heritage that is unique to the region.

The Brandywine Creek yours to enjoy

Explore the Brandywine and its picturesque landscapes with over 37,000 acres of permanently protected open space. The adventure awaits in almost 8,500 acres of public parks and trails including the First State National Monument, Marsh Creek State Park, Brandywine Battlefield State Park, Struble Lake, Hibernia County Park, Springton Manor Farm County Park, Struble Trail, and over forty municipal parks.

Private-public partnership

Twenty-four municipalities along with individuals, interest groups, and public agencies are engaged in implementing projects to:

- Preserve and restore natural areas
- Improve water quality
- Enhance creek access and add new recreational opportunities
- Protect locally and nationally significant historic features
